What To Do When I Am Feeling Sick

- Inform your teacher who will give you a note to report to the clinic. In the case of a more serious injury, have someone notify the Deputy Principal and necessary arrangements will be made for your care.
- You may not enter or leave the Clinic without the Head Teacher Welfare or the Administration Officer entering your name in the Clinic Book.
- When you leave the Clinic you will be given a pass which you should give to your class teacher.
- Your parents will be notified if you are ill so they can collect and take you home as you are normally only allowed to remain in the Clinic for one period.
- All medication, with instructions, must be given to the Head Teacher Welfare.

What Happens If:

I lose property

Check the lost property cupboard located in the Library. To assist with identifying lost property, please ensure that you write your name on all clothing and other personal property that you bring to school. Do not bring valuables to school. The school does not accept responsibility for valuables brought to school.

I do not have the correct equipment for lessons

Bring a note from home and inform your teacher.

1 am out of uniform

Bring a note from home and show it to the Deputy Principal before school. Your note will be signed and should be produced on request.

I need to pay money to the Office

Payments can be made before school, at recess and lunchtime (except Friday recess). The student ID card must be presented each time any payments are made.

I lose my Library card

Report the loss immediately to the Library. A new card will be arranged.

In Term 1 2019, our school is taking part in the *Tell Them From Me* student survey. The survey will provide us with valuable feedback on what our students think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. The survey is completed on-line and is run by an independent research company, **The Learning Bar**, which specialises in school-based surveys.

Parent Information Kits that include an information sheet, consent form and privacy statement will be sent home to you by your child's school. To consent to the vaccination of your child, parents/guardians are advised to:

- read all the information provided;
- complete the consent form, including signing your name next to each of the vaccine/s you would like your child to receive;
- return the completed consent form to your child's school;
- ensure that your child eats breakfast on the day of the school vaccination clinic.

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw consent for any reason may do so by writing to the school Principal or phone the school. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation.

To improve vaccination completion, students will be opportunistically offered any missed vaccine/s throughout the year where possible.

Please note that students who commence the HPV vaccination in school clinics in Year 7 but do not complete the course during the school year may be offered a catch-up dose at school in Year 8. Students who have their first HPV dose at their GP will be advised to complete the course with their GP.

A Record of Vaccination will be provided to each student vaccinated at each clinic. You should ensure that this record is kept for future reference. Please do not assume that your child has been vaccinated if you do not receive this Record of Vaccination. Vaccination records will be uploaded to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR) to provide a complete immunisation history for your child.


