Baulkham Hills High School is a caring school. If you have any social, emotional, physical or academic problems we can help. Talk to the Counsellor, Head Teacher Welfare, Year Adviser, Prefects, Peer Support Leaders or any teacher. If anything at all is worrying you, we will listen and help. If you have financial problems please see the Bursar, Mr Parnaby.

Homework:-

Homework is valued at Baulkham Hills High School as a means of encouraging you to:

- Develop a habit of reviewing work studied in class.
- Undertake preparation for lessons.
- Undertake extension work which challenges and extends.

Homework is given regularly in all subjects and is to be recorded by you in your school diary. Homework will be monitored by teachers, and parents or caregivers will be informed if satisfactory completion of homework becomes a problem.

Every effort will be made to recognise students' commitments out of school hours when allocating homework, assignments and tests. In this regard students will normally be able to negotiate realistic homework demands with teachers.

International Linguistics Olympiad (IOL) - Korea

From Monday July 29 to Friday 2 August, four Year 12 students from BHHS competed as one of two Australian teams in the 17th International Linguistics Olympiad (IOL), held in Yongin, Korea Republic. The team, consisting of Anna Zhou, Cathy Doan, Lyn Wang and Pavitraa Hathi, qualified for the event by gaining second place (out of over 500 teams) in the national OzCLO linguistics competition. This is the second time that a team from Baulko has achieved this honour, following the success of our 2016 IOL pioneers. The girls were accompanied by Mrs. Milne and Mr. Salter.

The IOL requires competitors to deduce the structure of five unfamiliar languages from a limited set of data. The problems demand a combination of linguistic knowledge, logic and analytical perseverance. The Baulko team very much enjoyed the challenge, and took part eagerly in the solution discussions following the competition. Although we didn't bring home any medals this time, the competition organisers gave Cathy the unofficial title of "meme lord" of the IOL due to the many hilarious IOL-related memes she produced in the course of the week!



Of course, our week in Korea wasn't all about linguistics. We were exposed to the many joys and surprises of Korea, a nation with a rich and vibrant culture, both ancient and contemporary. In the course of the week, the about girls learned



traditional Korean costumes, K-pop dancing, the history of the Hangeul writing system, contemporary styles in Korean dress and music, and much more...all while making friends with other competitors from all around the globe, from the Netherlands to Nepal.

It was an unforgettable week for the Baulko students and their accompanying teachers, and many thanks are due to the IOL Chief Organiser Minkyu Kim and his resourceful team. At the Australian end, we must thank the OzCLO organisers for their help in facilitating the trip, as well as Dr. Bathgate, Ms. Lennox and Ms. Plant who did a lot of work behind the scenes to get us to Korea.

May the Baulko IOL tradition continue in years to come!

Yr 9 Duke of Ed Camp 2019

Yr 9 students will be attending the Duke of Ed Bronze Award Camp from Monday 9th September to Friday 13th September 2019 at Camp Somerset. Permission notes were issued to students in June, and are due on 9th August 2019.

The Duke of Ed Award is a leading structured (non-formal education) youth development program, empowering all young Australians aged 14-24 to explore their full potential and find their purpose, passion and place in the world, regardless of their location or circumstance. The Award is a fully inclusive program and has no social, political, or religious affiliations.

Through this challenging journey of self-discovery, students:

- Are equipped and empowered to achieve their personal best
- Learn to take responsibility for their goals and choices
- Become connected to and actively engaged within their immediate community
- Make a real difference to society through their positive contributions and involvement
- Learn to persevere and overcome barriers to success
- Learn important life skills
- Increase their career opportunities.

Bronze Expeditions Overview

The Bronze Expeditions are the beginning of the passage through the Duke of Edinburgh Adventurous Journeys. The Preliminary Training and Bronze Expeditions are important in laying the foundations of basic navigation, campcraft and team skills to build on throughout the following Silver and Gold levels. Skills learnt and experiences gained are also valuable to students as they emerge from adolescence to adulthood.

Bronze Preliminary Training

The Preliminary Training is conducted at Somerset Base on the first day and covers areas essential for safety and general wellbeing whilst on expedition. Some areas covered include: planning and preparation of an expedition; navigation; basic first aid; food, water and equipment requirements; and campcraft. Students will learn how to repack their gear correctly and will complete a route plan on the first day in preparation for the following expedition.



Practice Expedition

Our aim at Somerset is to provide an open environment in which the students gain a solid base of knowledge and skills, which can then be further built upon at the Silver level. The Bronze Practice Expedition will take the fundamentals learnt during the Preliminary Training and ground them in a real-time experience. The students start their Practice Hike mid-morning on the second day after finalising their Training. Students are given roles throughout the expedition to improve on the skills they learn during the Training and the Group Leader gives lessons and training along the way. When they reach their campsite they are involved in a session that covers all aspects of the camping experience.



Qualitying Expedition

The Qualifying or Test Expedition has the aim of allowing students to apply the skills they gained during the Preliminary Training and Practice Expedition in a practical setting. Students are given the responsibility of leadership and ownership of their expedition with the Group Leader being in a position to simply supervise the expedition, assess the application of student's skills and step in only for safety or to get students back on track.

Before starting off, a check of equipment and route plans will occur with the expedition beginning directly afterwards.







On the final day, students pack up their campsite and head out onto the last leg of their hike. All students end up back at Somerset Base at the end of their expedition to clean / dry any gear used for the expedition, pack up all equipment neatly and debrief.
