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Baulkham Hills High School Seeking expressions of interest regarding the 2020 ICAS in SCICENCE Years 7, 8, 9, 10

About ICAS:

The International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (ICAS) is an independent, quality skillsbased assessment program which rewards and recognises achievement. ICAS gives you broad insights into your child's performance across English, Mathematics and Science. ICAS (sometimes referred to as the UNSW assessments) has been developed by Educational Assessment Australia (EAA) since 1981. <u>This year the ICAS exams will be conducted online</u>. To learn more about ICAS go to www.eaa.unsw.edu.au/icas/about

The Baulkham Hills High School Science Faculty wishes to assess parents' interest in their child(ren) of Years 7, 8, 9, 10 sitting ICAS Science in 2020. If sufficient interest, then the exam would be run at Baulkham Hills High School during Week 5 of Term 3 (17 to 21 August). Sitting dates for each Year would be advised once expected numbers are known.

- Note that these assessments would be held before school hours: arrival by 7:15 am to be seated for the one-hour assessment; 7:30 to 8:30 am.
- If your child is sick or late on the day, there are no make-up test dates offered.
- The result of the assessment would not be part of your child's reportable assessment, rather their ICAS attendance would be registered as an 'extracurricular activity'.
- The fee for 2020 ICAS Science online test is \$15.95 AUD (inc GST)
- It would be the parent's responsibility to visit the ICAS site to enrol their child and complete the online form as well as payment prior to the ICAS closing date of 25 July 2020. NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED. (The School code required for enrolment will be provided once it is determined that ICAS Science will be offered by BHHS.)
- Limited technical support may be available at time of test; however, it is the student's responsibility to ensure that their device is fully charged and that they have logged onto the ICAS practise link to ensure successful connection. Any connection issues should be referred to the School's ICT team for resolution prior to the sitting date.

Please note that this year BHHS will not be accepting any payments for ICAS. All payments are to be made directly to UNSW Global using the online parent payment system.

Careers Update for Year 12 Parents – UAC Educational Access Scheme (EAS)

Dear parents of Year 12 students

I wanted to inform you of the following information that has been provided to Year 12 via Google Classroom about new categories of under UAC's EAS (<u>note that students need to have completed and</u> paid for their UAC application before they can access EAS via the same portal):

For students who have been disadvantaged by either the recent bushfires or by financial consequences of COVID-19

These disadvantages will be available for selection from 1 August 2020.

If a student has already applied, they will be able to add these disadvantages to their existing application from 1 August 2020.

COVID-19 Disadvantages

UAC has added 2 categories for if your parents are receiving JobKeeper or JobSeeker payments due to COVID-19. Note that the students most disadvantaged by COVID-19 may already be eligible under at least one of the existing EAS categories relating to financial disadvantage, home environment and personal illness.

F01K – Job Keeper

This will be granted to applicants who can show that their parent(s)/guardian(s) are in receipt of the Job Keeper allowance for a period of at least three months.

Applicants will have to provide the letters that each employee (parent/guardian) will receive from their employer.

F01S – Job Seeker

This will be granted to applicants who can show that their parent(s)/guardian(s) are in receipt of the Job Seeker allowance for a period of at least three months from March 2020 onwards.



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Applicants will have to provide their parent(s)/guardian(s) Centrelink statement showing this payment (as is the case with F01D [family tax benefit] currently).

As is the case with all EAS disadvantages, it is for each Institution to decide on the weighting they place on these new disadvantages and allocate adjustments/places accordingly.

For students who have been disadvantaged by the recent bushfires

N01D: Natural disasters

Eligibility criteria

Your education has been negatively impacted during Year 11 and/or 12 (or equivalent) due to the impact of a natural disaster. Natural disasters in Australia can include but are not limited to heatwaves, bushfires, droughts, floods, severe storms and tropical cyclones, earthquakes, tsunamis and landslides. (Healthdirect.gov.au)

Documentation required

Applicants must provide evidence of any disaster relief payments or other payments from a State or Federal government body related to the specific natural disaster.

These payments can be to the applicant themselves, or

The applicants' parent/s (or guardian/s) – in this case the address to which the payment has been made, must match the applicants address.

Applicants, or applicants' parent's (or guardian/s) who have not received a disaster relief payment, or other payments from a government body related to the specific natural disaster can still apply. The burden of proving the educational impact will be incumbent upon the applicant and will have to reach the same level as applicants who received payments.

This evidence can be in the form of:

- Insurance documents
- SES reports
- Bank documents and/or
- Government documentation.
- Important information

The address on any payments made to parent/s (or guardian/s) must match the applicant address within UAC system for a positive assessment.



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Generation Entrepreneur Startup+ Online Course/Competition

During Weeks 5-10 of Term 2, 74 Year 10 and 11 students participated in a new online entrepreneurship course and competition with Generation Entrepreneur called Startup+. Students completed 1 module per week in Problem Solving, Customer Development, Product Development, Lean Business Canvas, Pitching, and received advice from mentors via video as well as the Generation Entrepreneur team via Microsoft Teams.

Teams of 4-5 students designed their business ideas around 3 key areas (the Elderly, Education & Food Security) with the focus on resilience based on the challenges of 2020: *How can we provide support for the vulnerable and create products that make a positive difference in the community?*

Teams submitted tasks each week and their final task was to submit a 5-minute video of their business pitch and their slide deck.

The winning team from Year 11 was called coVVin (Gauri, Luchith, Satvik, Parth & Omkar). A big congratulations to this team and also Train Forest (Khushi, Manasvi, Sangeetha, Harini & Shahana) who came 2nd and Sanj Mortgages (Simone, Jasleen, Nandini and Angelina) who came 3rd.

Congratulations to all teams for their hard work and collaboration in designing these innovative ideas – your work was very impressive!
