From the principal's desk:

Year 12 have entered their second Buffer Week before the Trial HSC begins at the end of next week. Any absence in this period must be explained by a medical certificate.

COVID-19 has meant all sorts of changes to the operation of the school. One significant change which begins today is that any student (from any year group) who is away for three days or more must produce a medical certificate to explain their absence. Failure to satisfactorily explain a lengthy absence may mean that the school involves the Home School Liaison Officer (HSLO). There is NO online learning happening now that all students are supposed to be back to school. Those students who are absent from school because they live someone who is vulnerable are expected to be attending school and taking suitable at home precautions protect the vulnerable person(s).

Explanation of Absences

Dear Parents / Guardians

When your child is away from school it is important parents comply with the guidelines set out in the Student Attendance Policy, Student Attendance in Government Schools Procedures, as well as established school procedures.

Absence from School

Parents are required to provide an explanation of absence to the school **within seven (7)** days from the first day of any period of absence.

If a student is absent for three (3) days or more a medical certificate is required.

Absentee Notice

Periodically the school sends home an Absentee Notice when an explanation for absence has not been received.

If you receive an Absentee Notice please provide an explanation of absence and inform the school immediately.

Procedure for Late Arrivals

If a student arrives at school late, they must provide a note to the office signed by their parent/guardian when signing in giving reasons for their partial absence. **The student needs to sign in at the Office when they arrive at school including senior students with late study leave.** The student will be issued a late arrival pass which they can present to their teacher when they arrive in class.

If a note is not provided from home, the student will be issued with a late pass slip which is signed by a parent/guardian. The signed slip must be handed into the office the next day.

Procedure for Early Leavers

If a student needs to leave school early, they must provide a note from their parent/guardian giving reasons for their partial absence. The student needs to get the note signed by a Deputy Principal before school and hand into the office by 8.30am where they will be issued an early leave pass. The student can then present the pass to their teacher and leave school at the time advised on their early leave pass.

Senior Students with Early Study Leave permission should sign out at the office before leaving School.

Procedure for Sick Students

Students who are sick in class should see a teacher for written permission to go to sick bay. They must go to sick bay (which is in the Front Office) and follow instructions from the office staff, who will contact a parent/guardian when necessary. Sick bay is used for a short time only. Students should not call their parents first. Please be advised the school does not supply any medication (panadol).



Naidoc Week at Baulkham Hills High School Week 10 Term 2

NAIDOC Week celebrations are usually held across Australia each July to celebrate the history, culture, and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. NAIDOC is celebrated not only in Indigenous communities, but by Australians from all walks of life. The week is a great opportunity to participate in a range of activities and to support your local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community.

NAIDOC originally stood for 'National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee'. This committee was once responsible for organising national activities during NAIDOC Week and its acronym has since become the name of the week itself.

Due to COVID the official week has been moved to later in the year. At BHHS, the Prefects and the Aboriginal Education team went ahead with our celebrations in Term 2. Week 10 was full of events to celebrate Aboriginal culture and provided many opportunities for BHHS students to engage in meaningful activities.

The Prefects created a superb and highly informative lesson which all students participated in period 1 on Monday morning. The prefects are to be commended on their hard work and dedication to this project. They received lots of great feedback and the students all really enjoyed themselves. On Tuesday, Support students, Prefects and a few students from each year group participated in an incursion with Miss Pugliano around Acknowledgement of Country. An 'Acknowledgement of Country' is an opportunity to acknowledge, and pay respect, to the Traditional Owners and ongoing custodians of the land - the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. Acknowledgements are often made at the commencement of an event, such as a meeting, speech, or formal occasion. An acknowledgement can be made by anybody, Indigenous or non-Indigenous. An Acknowledgement of Country will often highlight the unique position of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in Australian culture and history.

During this day, these students created a BHHS Acknowledgement of Country video that will be used at BHHS school events. This was a fun day where students worked collaboratively across year groups to create a special artefact which will be treasured for years to come. Most impressing was the student's willingness to learn traditional Aboriginal Dance and movement. Stay tuned for the finished product. Thank you to Bob Chen and William Dang on their work creating and editing the footage.

Students also worked collaboratively at lunch time on Wednesday to create a school 2020 Naidoc week painting. This will be displayed in the library. A very contemporary Aboriginal inspired painting that is rich in symbology. Congratulations to all students who entered the Naidoc week art competition. Some very strong entries and it was very hard to choose a winner. All entries are currently being exhibited in the library if you are interested in having a look.



Careers Update for Year 12 Parents – UAC Educational Access Scheme (EAS)

Dear parents of Year 12 students

I wanted to inform you of the following information that has been provided to Year 12 via Google Classroom about new categories of under UAC's EAS (<u>note that students need to have completed and paid for their UAC application before they can access EAS via the same portal</u>):

For students who have been disadvantaged by either the recent bushfires or by financial consequences of COVID-19

These disadvantages will be available for selection from 1 August 2020.

If a student has already applied, they will be able to add these disadvantages to their existing application from 1 August 2020.

COVID-19 Disadvantages

UAC has added 2 categories for if your parents are receiving JobKeeper or JobSeeker payments due to COVID-19. Note that the students most disadvantaged by COVID-19 may already be eligible under at least one of the existing EAS categories relating to financial disadvantage, home environment and personal illness.

F01K - Job Keeper

This will be granted to applicants who can show that their parent(s)/guardian(s) are in receipt of the Job Keeper allowance for a period of at least three months.

Applicants will have to provide the letters that each employee (parent/guardian) will receive from their employer.

F01S - Job Seeker



This will be granted to applicants who can show that their parent(s)/guardian(s) are in receipt of the Job Seeker allowance for a period of at least three months from March 2020 onwards.

Applicants will have to provide their parent(s)/guardian(s) Centrelink statement showing this payment (as is the case with F01D [family tax benefit] currently).

As is the case with all EAS disadvantages, it is for each Institution to decide on the weighting they place on these new disadvantages and allocate adjustments/places accordingly.

For students who have been disadvantaged by the recent bushfires

N01D: Natural disasters

Eligibility criteria

Your education has been negatively impacted during Year 11 and/or 12 (or equivalent) due to the impact of a natural disaster. Natural disasters in Australia can include but are not limited to heatwaves, bushfires, droughts, floods, severe storms and tropical cyclones, earthquakes, tsunamis and landslides. (Healthdirect.gov.au)

Documentation required

Applicants must provide evidence of any disaster relief payments or other payments from a State or Federal government body related to the specific natural disaster.

These payments can be to the applicant themselves, or

The applicants' parent/s (or guardian/s) – in this case the address to which the payment has been made, must match the applicants address.

Applicants, or applicants' parent's (or guardian/s) who have not received a disaster relief payment, or other payments from a government body related to the specific natural disaster can still apply. The burden of proving the educational impact will be incumbent upon the applicant and will have to reach the same level as applicants who received payments.

This evidence can be in the form of:

- Insurance documents
- SES reports
- Bank documents and/or
- Government documentation.
- Important information

The address on any payments made to parent/s (or guardian/s) must match the applicant address within UAC system for a positive assessment.



Generation Entrepreneur Startup+ Online Course/Competition

During Weeks 5-10 of Term 2, 74 Year 10 and 11 students participated in a new online entrepreneurship course and competition with Generation Entrepreneur called Startup+. Students completed 1 module per week in Problem Solving, Customer Development, Product Development, Lean Business Canvas, Pitching, and received advice from mentors via video as well as the Generation Entrepreneur team via Microsoft Teams.

Teams of 4-5 students designed their business ideas around 3 key areas (the Elderly, Education & Food Security) with the focus on resilience based on the challenges of 2020: *How can we provide support for the vulnerable and create products that make a positive difference in the community?*


Teams submitted tasks each week and their final task was to submit a 5-minute video of their business pitch and their slide deck.




