The Year 12 Formal will be held on Monday 23rd November. Students have already been given information about this. The cost of \$130 needs to be paid to the front office by Thursday this week. If students had already paid for the camp, which did not eventuate, they can transfer this money to the formal and be given a refund for the balance of the money.

If your child is sick for any reason please do not send them to school. We do not have medical facilities and we are not a child minding centre. If you send an unwell child to school we will request you to pick them up immediately.

Thank you to the 60+ Year 7 parents who expressed concern (via a petition) about student use of phones and digital devices. This is a BYOD school and all students are expected to have a laptop for every lesson. The use of mobile phones is a matter for parents. If you don't want your child to use it at school, don't give them one in the first place. If there is an issue at school concerning your child we will make contact with you, so your child really does not need a mobile phone during the day. The school has no intention of confiscating phones and hence taking responsibility for

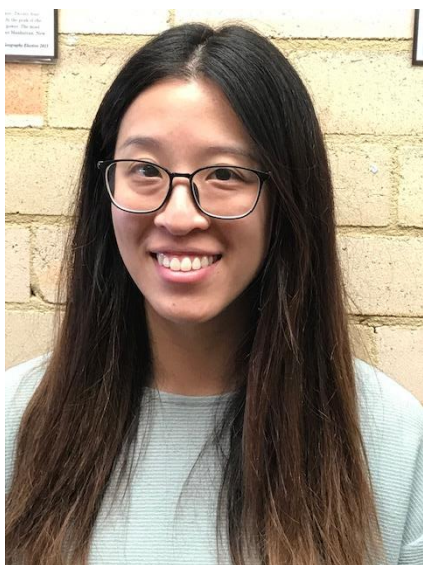

Australian Mathematical Olympiad Committee Senior Contest



The 2020 AMOC Senior Contest took place on 18 August, bringing together some of the finest young problem solvers from around the country in this invitation-only competition.

This contest is a major part of the Australian Mathematics Trust's Olympiad program. It is used by them to identify talented students who may be invited to the AMOC School of Excellence in December, which is an important step in the pathway to representing Australia at such international events as the International Mathematical Olympiad and European Girls' Mathematical Olympiad.

Invitations to the AMOC Senior Contest, held in August each year and Australian Mathematical Olympiad, held in February each year, are the responsibility of the AMOC State Director in each state or territory.

We were fortunate to have 3 students invited to sit this competition David Chen (Year 10), Cloris Xu (Year 8) and Iris Xu (Year 8). Only about 150 students across Australia are invited to sit this competition with the vast majority being in Year 10 or 11.

I would like to congratulate all three students David and Iris for achieving a Bronze award and Cloris for achieving an Honourable Mention.

2021 C.A.S. Hawker Scholarships

The 2021 **C.A.S. Hawker Scholarships** open on **Monday 7th December** and close on **Friday 8th January** 2021.

C.A.S. Hawker Scholarships are one of the most generous privately funded scholarships available to undergraduate students in Australia. Each residential scholarship is valued at up to **\$60,000** over three years. The scholarships are available to all Australian students. The majority have been awarded to students entering their first year of university.

Selection is largely based on personal qualities and demonstrated leadership as well as academic ability. Undergraduate Hawker Scholars are able to attend a range of Australian educational institutions.

The Charles Hawker Scholarship perpetuates the memory of scholar, soldier and pastoralist Charles Allan Seymour Hawker and commemorates the achievements of one of Australia's most respected statesmen.

C.A.S. Hawker Scholarships have been presented by Governors-General **Ms Quentin Bryce AC** and **Major General Michael Jeffery AC**, Australia's Chief Scientist **Professor Ian Chubb AC**, South Australian Premier **Hon Jay Weatherill MP**, former Speaker of the House of Representatives **Hon David Hawker AO**, Australian of the Year **Dr Richard Harris SC OAM** and Director of the Australian War Memorial **Dr. Brendan Nelson AO**.

Procedure for Late Arrivals

Careers Update for Year 12 Parents – UAC Educational Access Scheme (EAS)

Dear parents of Year 12 students

I wanted to inform you of the following information that has been provided to Year 12 via Google Classroom about new categories of under UAC's EAS (***note that students need to have completed and paid for their UAC application before they can access EAS via the same portal***):

For students who have been disadvantaged by either the recent bushfires or by financial consequences of COVID-19

These disadvantages will be available for selection from 1 August 2020.

If a student has already applied, they will be able to add these disadvantages to their existing application from 1 August 2020.

Virtual Work Experience available for senior school students (Years 10/11/12)

Inside Sherpa

Inside Sherpa is an organisation founded by and aimed at uni students getting professional experience before they complete their degrees, therefore it is suitable for students at a selective high school. Students complete in their own pace at their own time and can sign up anytime (for free). They receive a certificate which lists the tasks they have undertaken. Placements are mostly in the corporate sector and include placements with Microsoft, BCG, Commonwealth Bank, Deloitte and a number of top tier law firms in the areas of technology, business and law amongst others. There is also a program in human rights law, one with the NSW Government and a general Work Readiness Program.

Throughout the competition you will be working alongside our industry mentors to develop a business solution to tackle the issue. In true startup-style, the competition will come down to the final Shark Tank pitch where the Finder judges will evaluate all of the pitches and choose a final champion! FAQs

Q: When and where will the competition be held?

A: The competition will take place entirely online over one week during the school holidays from Monday 28th September - Sunday 4th October.

Q: How many people can be in a team?

A: Teams need to consist of 2-5 female students each. Students from years 7-12 are eligible.
Don't have a team of 2-5? Apply as an individual and you will be placed into a team!

Q: What skills and knowledge will I need for this competition?

A: Although there are no strict prerequisites, the challenges in this competition will be based on the concepts covered in our Initiate 48 program (Problem Solving, Customer Development, Product Development, Lean Business and Pitching). Some of the key skills that will be tested in this competition include teamwork, leadership, critical thinking, adaptability and creativity.

Q: How much time do I need to commit?

A: We recommend that you spend at least 1-2 hours hustling with your team every day. However, dedicating more time to building your business will make you more likely to win 1st place!

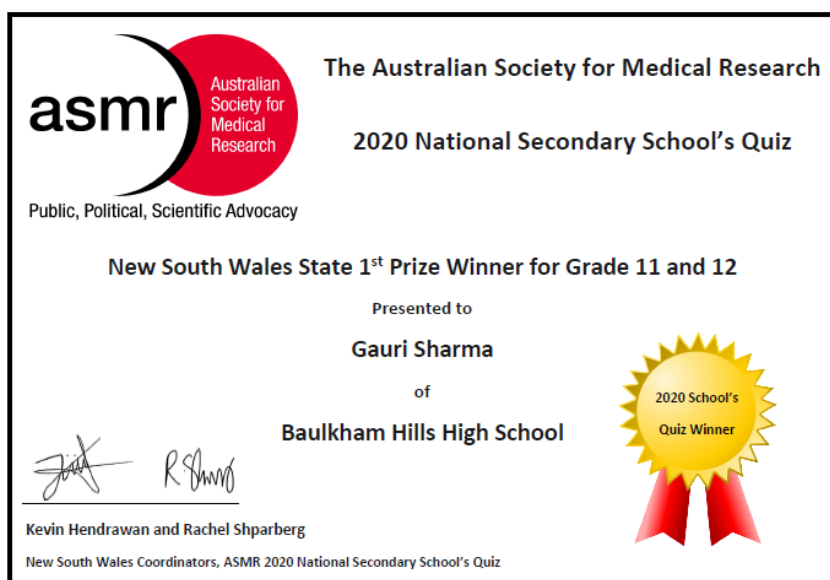


NSW State winner Australian Medical School Research Quiz

Gauri Sharma (Year 11) received 1st place in NSW for a quiz run by the Australian Society of Medical Research (ASMR) for high school students in Years 11 and 12, based on her quiz score and the creativity and thoughtfulness of her response to support an argument for using a hypothetical \$1 million towards lung diseases and pandemics.

We would also like to personally say that we were impressed by Gauri Sharma's open-ended response, and that it was the best response we have seen across students in NSW this year. The response demonstrated immense effort in supporting the argument for using the hypothetical 1 million dollars towards lung diseases and pandemics. We especially appreciate the effort made in promoting Gauri's experiences and qualifications in the response. As such, the response was almost reminiscent of a research grant proposal that medical researchers often write, which is impressive.

You should prevent the spread of viruses, by keeping your [hands clean](#), not touching your face and [keeping your distance](#) from other people.

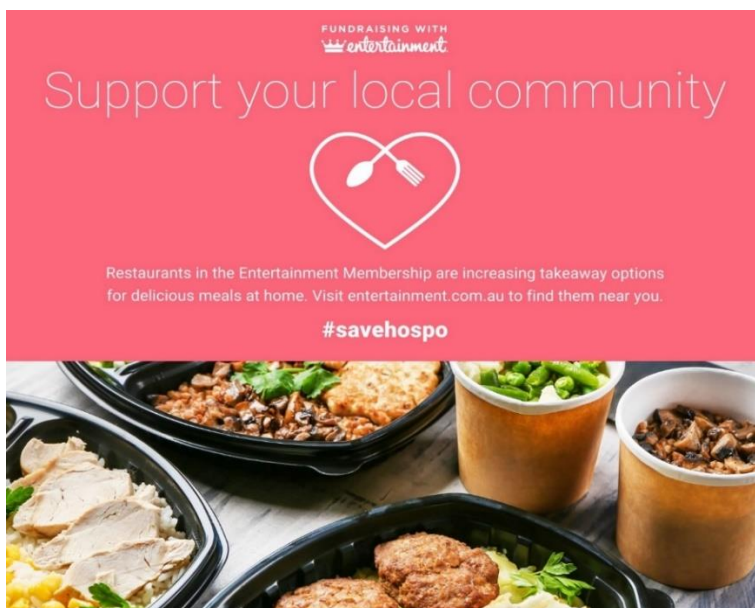

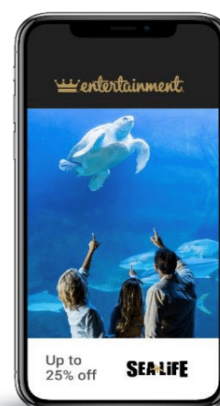
