Year 8 Geography Excursion to the Blue Mountains

On the 17th of May, year 8 students of BHHS went on an excursion to the Blue Mountains. After a tedious one and half hour in the bus, we arrived at our destination, welcomed by a cold gust of wind on the high altitude of the blue mountains.

Our first destination was Katoomba Falls Reserve, and through the use of weather instruments (and the Bureau of Meteorology), we learnt to measure factors of the climate, like temperature, humidity, light and wind speed. Following this, we went on the Furber-Steps Walking track where we were able to trek through the rainforest. Not long after, we were asked to stay silent and observe the environment we were in. Eyes closed, the soft crashes from the waterfall, trillings of the birds and the distant passerby cars could all be heard.

We took a short break, before proceeding to the next destination, Echo Point which is one of the biggest tourist attractions of the Blue Mountains. There, we first handedly took in the view of the Three Sisters, Mount Solitary, Jamison Valley and the King's Tableland. From there, we took the Prince Henry Cliff Walk, and crossed through the Kedumba River and then to Katoomba Falls. However, the path we took was extremely muddy and some of our shoes had been soaked, but the journey ended with a sense of accomplishment as we finally arrived back at Katoomba Falls Reserve.

We then had our lunch there for 40 minutes and then we were back on the buses, arriving at school around 3pm. And that summed up our euphoric experience in the Blue Mountains excursion.



Music:

In Music this term Year 8 have started a topic on Music in Everyday Life. We have spent time looking into how music effects the brain, memory, and emotions, whilst also looking closely at how we all encounter music in everyday life. I have been very impressed by the way students have thought deeply about the impacts of music on their lives, and the places they encounter music by chance, which included in advertising, shopping centres, restaurants, and even the school bell (which plays a major arpeggio).

Recently as part of this unit we have looked more closely at pop and rock music, providing Year 8 students with the chance to learn to play the drums. Since there is only one drum kit in each classroom, we've had to get inventive! Students have been asked to bring chopsticks to school to imitate drum sticks while they learn to play a basic rock beat, with every student given the opportunity to play this on the drum kit once they have mastered the chopsticks. Year 8s have also chosen objects from around their classrooms or in their school bags to use as hi-hat cymbals or snare

drums, challenging students to think creatively about the tone and pitch of each object. Some of the most interesting sounding objects have included metal water bottles, music stands, and a persimmon. Both Mr Murphy and Ms Kim have been very impressed by Year 8's rhythmic skills!







- Fever (37.5°C or higher)
- cough
- sore/scratchy throat
- shortness of breath
- loss of smell or
- loss of taste

Other reported symptoms include:

- fatigue
- runny nose
- muscle pain
- joint pain
- headache
- diarrhoea
- nausea/vomiting
- loss of appetite

When COVID-19 symptoms appear

The amount of time between exposure to the virus and the first appearance of symptoms is usually 5 to 6 days, although it may range from 2 to 14 days.
