cover skills in reading, writing, grammar and spelling, punctuation, and numeracy. The assessments are undertaken every year. The data our school receives from NAPLAN forms part of the picture that informs targeted and whole-school strateay and planning to support student learning.

I would like to reiterate a message from last week's newsletter. As per the Baulkham Hills High School 2023 HSC Assessment Policy, "students should be present at school to complete and submit all assessment tasks and examinations. Students and parents/carers should NOT assume leave will granted be in circumstances where family holidays, social engagements or other matters of a discretionary nature clash with school assessment tasks and HSC tasks. Students are expected to complete all tasks and sit for all examinations set as part of the assessment program for a course at the specified time. The Department of Education discourages students taking leave during the school term". It goes on to say that "the Department of Education's position in relation to student leave is stated in the Student Attendance in Government Schools Procedures School Attendance Policy. This policy has been developed by the Learning Engagement and Directorate in 2015. In section 14.1.

it states, "from the beginning of 2015, family holidays and travel are no longer considered under the Exemption from School - Procedures. Travel outside of the vacation period is now counted as an absence for statistical purposes". All assessments are conducted within the guidelines set by the New South Wales Education Standards Authority (NESA). The NESA guidelines for HSC students make no provision for tasks missed due to leave. There are well established protocols for illness and misadventure, however, requests for leave do not fall within these protocols. Students and families are expected to make arrangements to ensure that all requirements of the Preliminary and HSC courses can be fulfilled. All assessments must be completed at the scheduled time, unless students are affected by illness or misadventure".

INTERNATIONAL ()omen's Day



To celebrate International Women's Day last Wednesday (March 8), the History Faculty asked students to share a notable woman from history who has inspired them and these were some of the responses:

Ada Lovelace - she was one of the key pioneers of the computer. She faced much sexism but managed to write the first computer program and proposed the Analytical Engine.

- Kaushal, Year 9

Amelia Earhart - she wasn't afraid to break down barriers. In 1928, she was the first woman to fly as a passenger across the Atlantic Ocean. Then, in 1932, she became the first woman to pilot a plane across that ocean. There weren't many female pilots back then, and her actions inspired other women to follow their dreams.

- Priyanka and Abeena, Year 9

Princess Diana - she used her celebrity to raise awareness for a number of causes, from leprosy to domestic violence and mental health. She brought awareness to many issues within the British royalty and modernised the institution. She was the patron or president of over 100 charities and advocated for people with disabilities, homeless people, and those suffering from HIV/AIDS

- Anna and Anaya, Year 9

Kalpana Chawla - she was the first Indian woman to go into space. She first flew on Space Shuttle Columbia in 1997 as a mission specialist and primary robotic arm operator.

- Maahika, Year 9

Edith Cowan - she was the first female Member of Parliament in Australia and a pioneer for women's rights

Eleanor Roosevelt - She was the first lady of the United States from 1933 to 1945, making her the longest-serving first lady of the United States. She advocated for expanded roles for women in the workplace, the civil rights of African Americans and Asian Americans, and the rights of World War II refugees.

- Suhaila, Year 9

Marie Curie - a physicist and chemist that discovered Polonium and Radium, which help develop treatments for cancer. She was the first woman to win a Nobel Prize, the first person to win a Nobel Prize twice, and the only person to win a Nobel Prize in two scientific fields.

- Chris, Year 9

Florence Nightingale - British nurse who was best known for her contributions to nursing education and her plans for improving health care standards in hospitals. She established the principles for modern nursing and care of the wounded, and recognised that bad hygiene was often the reason why wounds became infected. She also advocated for better drainage to ward off waterborne diseases such as cholera, and showed care, compassion and devotion towards patients

- Amanda and Praseeda, Year 9

Hedy Lamarr - was born in an oppressive Austrian family that forced her to marry a man who, as it turned out, was a Nazi. In the 1940s, she moved to the USA as her husband was a Nazi spy. While there, Lamarr studied acting and went on to be "the most beautiful face of the 1940s film industry". After overhearing a top secret Nazi operation that would kill many, she joined forces with an engineer to create the basis for Wi-Fi.

- Ajay, Year 7

Frida Kahlo - disrupted gender roles and showcased feminism through her paintings. Frida stood for acceptance and freedom, aiming to challenge and change the public's stereotypes.
Expectations from genders were broken by her boxing, wearing both suits and dresses alike and keeping her facial hair to make a statement on female and male standards. She's become an international icon, influencing many artists and women.

- Annabel, Year 7

Emmeline Pankhurst - she co-founded the Women's Social and Political Union (WSPU) and was very determined to win women the right to vote in Britain

- Alice, Year 7

Rosa Parks - an American activist that had great involvement in the civil rights movement in America. She is most famous for when she refused to give up her seat in a bus for a white man, on a Montgomery, Alabama bus in 1955. This action inspired the leaders of the local black community and even got her arrested and fined. Despite knowing the consequences of her actions, she refused to take part in something that she knew was not right

Caroline Herschel - a German-born British astronomer. Despite the limited education she received, Herschel strived to follow in her brother's footsteps as an astronomer. In 1786, she became the first woman to discover a comet. Throughout the course of Herschel's successful career, she discovered eight comets and three nebulae. Herschel also published a revised version of a catalogue written by John Flamsteed, listing her corrections as well as adding on 560 stars. Herschel's significant work made her the first woman to earn a salary for her contribution to science. Herschel's perseverance and achievements in an era where women's work would often be discredited, is truly inspirational.

Virginia Woolf - one of the most well-known feminist authors of the 20th century. Born in 1882, London, Woolf grew up studying English classics and history. She produced many classics literature and feminist texts including "Mrs Dalloway" and "A Room of One's Own". During the inter-war period, Woolf's writing became a prominent part of English literary and artistic society. In the span of her life, Woolf's accomplishments led her to be recognised as one of the most innovative and evolutionary writers of her time and she continues to influence and inspire millions of people today.

Procedure for Early Leavers

If a student needs to leave school early, they must provide a note from their parent/guardian giving reasons for their partial absence. The student needs to get the note signed by a Deputy Principal before school and hand into the office by 8.30am where they will be issued an early leave pass. The student can then present the pass to their teacher and leave school at the time advised on their early leave pass.



IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT

School Bytes Finance Portal

The School Bytes portal provides flexibility for you to conveniently:

- Make school payments online (including paying for multiple siblings at once)
 - Use a family credit to pay for an activity/excursion or school fees
 - Download a receipt for payments made
 - View all historical payments in one place
 - Complete and submit digital permission notes
 - View the status of all permission notes

This can be done where you want at any time: day or night.

Through the portal, you will easily be able to download a receipt once a payment has been made and have access to view all historical payments when needed. Online payments are processed in real-time and can be viewed by school staff immediately.

While our preference is for payments to be made via the portal, we will still accept payment via cash, cheque, money order and EFTPOS.

Student Absence - SMS Response and Parent Portal

The Attendance App for student absences is no longer operational. If your child is absent please respond to the SMS that you will receive advising your student is absent on that day. You can also explain the absence via the parent portal for 1 to 2 days only. If any longer than 2 days, an email is required with an attached medical certificate.

Absence Explanations

Parents are required to provide an explanation of absence to the school on the day of absence or <u>within seven (7) days</u> from the first day of any period of absence, otherwise it will remain unjustified. If a student is absent for three (3) days or more a Medical Certificate is required.



School Opal Cards for bus travel

Busways has been conducting checks at your school regarding Opal card usage.

Your child did not have an Opal card today when travelling on the school bus.

Opal data gathered by tapping on and off is used to determine demand for bus services. If students don't tap on and tap off then school bus services will appear underutilised and may be considered for cancellation based on low passenger numbers.

Please ensure that your child has a valid Opal card (either a School or Child/Youth Opal card) and taps on and off when travelling to and from school.

TAFE Use

Students are reminded that the use of the adjacent TAFE facility to walk to and from Old Northern Rd is a privilege and not a right. Students are reminded to walk safely, quietly and quickly thorough the facility. Parents and carers are **not** permitted to enter, drive into, or park in the TAFE to pick up or drop off students.

Bus Travel

The **bus stop on Old Northern Rd in front of Baulkham Hills TAFE** is used each afternoon by approximately 100 students. Students have the privilege and responsibility of accessing this bus stop through the TAFE. I would remind students to be very careful and considerate when using and accessing this bus stop, waiting for a bus, and moving to the kerb to get on a bus. Buses sometimes approach the stop very quickly, with the front of the bus coming over the edge of the kerb. Please always demonstrate courtesy and safety, and remember that there is always another bus.

Student pickup after school

A reminder about parking and picking up around our school in the afternoons, especially in the school bus bay, Carver Crescent, Christopher Street, Coronation Road, and Baulkham Hills TAFE areas.

Please ensure you follow all traffic rules (especially traffic lights and not parking across driveways) when you are in these areas. You could even have your student walk a little but further away from the school gate – to assist their physical health, and alleviate the heavy traffic at the end of the school day.

The Hills Shire Council will have compliance officers at various times in these locations to ensure all drivers are following required traffic rules.
