Davidson Shield Semi-Final – Baulko Cricket Team

The Penrith Panthers were defeated in the NRL Grand Final in 2020 and then went on to win 4 years in a row. The Baulko cricket team were defeated in the 2023 Davidson Shield Final and have now reached the final in 2024...is this the start of our 4peat???

Last Monday, 28th October, Baulko's first XI faced the cricketers of Penrith High School. In typical Baulko style we lost the coin toss, but fortunately we were happy to start the day batting, with Pratheish and Shlok taking the crease. Together this pair put a partnership of 36 runs, in just 6 overs, before Pratheish was dismissed.

Unphased by a change in partner, Shlok continued strong towards the day's top score of 62. Both boys batted well, but eventually they fell to the spin attack of Penrith. Abhay, Ahbi and Gyan struggled with the spin bowling, each contributed a small amount to the score before dismissal. However, Sanit and Amodh took control of the final 10 batting overs, adding 74 runs to the team's total, with some excellent game management by Amodh, and some fantastic shots and excellent technique by Sanjit. Walking off at the end of innings, the boys were happy with the score of 6/198.

After the lunch break, Penrith came out swinging, with a quick 24 runs in their first 5 overs. However, a tactical bowling change by Baulko's captain Abhay, resulted in our first wicket. It was an amazing individual effort by Riyyan, who took an excellent diving caught-and-bowled wicket, finishing his first over with a wicket maiden. Inspired by this effort, Amodh claimed the second wicket, almost immediately after, with a lovely ball outside off-stump, edged to Abhay at keeper.

With these two early wickets, the pressure was placed onto Penrith to stabilise their innings. But Baulko did not relent, going after the win. Leading the way, Riyyan took another wicket in his third over, wicket, clean bowled. In his fourth over, wicket, gloved by the batter, through to the keeper. 4/36 after 12 overs looked very promising. However, the two new batters gained some stability, getting Penrith to 54 runs in the next 5 overs. Another tactical bowling change for Baulko, and the game took a sudden turn.

"Change of Bowler...Jashanjot".

To this point, Jashanjot had limited experience in Davidson Shield. But when your captain hands you the ball to bowl, you need to show what you've got. His first ball must have looked like gold, to the batter. Slow. Full toss. Excellent height to smash. Straight into the hands of Anav, who had been waiting to show his good form.

Second ball. Too short. Slow. Not too much turn. But enough turn to be mis-hit by the new batter to Riyyan on the boundary.



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Two balls, two wickets. Now on a hat-trick ball, Jashanjot bowled his third. Smashed for six over Riyyan's head. But any good bowler knows, when you're hit or six, your next ball better be good. Slow, short, a bit of turn. Caught by Riyyan on the boundary. Jashanjot's first over - WW6W**. What a game changer. Leaving Penrith at 7/71 after 20 overs.

After the drinks break, Abhay continued the bowling spells of Pratheish and Jashanjot, planning to change back to his openers to finish off the game after two overs each. But it seems Pratheish must have known this because in the 23rd over he decided to strike.

Single. Wicket. Dot ball. Wicket. Wicket. Game over.

With outstanding performances from all of the team, the game was secured and Baulko heads to the final. In the other bracket, Model Farms are playing Cumberland (quarter-final) and the winner will play Parramatta (semi-final). The winner of that bracket will play us in the final.

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Careers News

Mohijit Singh and Eddie Li from Year 11 went to the UBS Finance Academy earlier this year and it's a great example of the kinds of opportunities available to students. It is a very competitive entry process and we had over 20 students apply. UBS only selects 2 students per school. Here is their report form the day:

"The UBS Finance Academy is a three-day program intended to give 50 Year 11 students with an interest in finance a taste of the array of careers in the finance and the broader business sector.

Over the course of the program, we were constantly exposed to different people and learnt about their roles and responsibilities in their current positions, how they got to where they are, and what really excites them looking forward in the finance world. It was definitely an eye-opener into the variety of opportunities available, including as investment bankers, venture capitalists, asset and wealth managers, strategists and stock brokers.

A few activities that stood out to us included a tour of the trading floor and a mock 'Shark Tank' pitch that we all did on the last day. In the lead up to our tour of the trading floor, many of us joked with each other trying to guess what it would be like (almost all of us said something along the lines of Wolf of Wall Street). Although the trading floor was nothing like Wolf of Wall Street, it's interesting 'no phone' policy on specifically light gray carpet, arrays of monitors of trading charts and excel sheets and the surprisingly mild buzz of stock brokers talking to their clients, showed us the true reality and complexities of how trading works and gave us an invaluable experience. We later created a Shark Tank presentation where we had to create a startup and pitch it to a panel of judges in hopes of



getting their support and funding. Despite both of us not winning the competition, we both thoroughly enjoyed the excitement and passion in building a startup with our group members as well as hearing the ingenious and hilarious pitches of other groups.

But what excited us the most was the strong vision of every speaker regarding the role of the next generation in solving the problems of the future - climate change, artificial intelligence, geopolitical tensions, efficient waste usage and trade diversification. Fuelling innovation and thinking outside the box will be an essential role of the financial system to provide solutions to these issues.

The program introduced us to ambitious peers from diverse schools, each bringing unique perspectives to our discussions and fostering lasting friendships. A networking function allowed us to connect with UBS employees and cadets on a more personal level, offering the opportunity to ask any questions and gain valuable insights on topics such as university life, the HSC, career paths, and the realities of their roles.



Overall, we would definitely recommend applying for the academy for anyone who is intrigued and wants a unique experience of the finance industry.

Term 4 School Student Travel

School student travel information for parents and students

School Travel Passes

Applications are now open for 2025 School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) travel.

Students in the Opal network applying for an Opal card (including a Term Bus Pass) for the first time will receive their School Opal card at their nominated postal address from mid-January 2025.

Students who require a School Opal card or travel pass but have not yet applied need to apply or update their details as soon as possible.

In the Opal network, students should travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their <u>local</u> bus operator to discuss their travel needs.

Students living in rural and regional areas will receive their travel pass from their nominated transport operator. It may be issued via their school or be sent directly to them at home.

Note: some rural and regional operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

Terms of Use

Students using School Opal cards must tap on and tap off in line with the Opal terms of use.

This includes travel within the approved times between 6.30am and 7.00pm from Monday to Friday on school days only. Students must use their Child/Youth Opal card for any travel outside these times.

All students are required to comply with the <u>Student code of conduct</u>. The code of conduct aims to ensure the safety and well-being of school children and other passengers. It is important that parents ensure their child is aware of this, as failure to comply with the code of conduct can result in a suspension from travel.

Administration Updates

Absence Explanations

Parents are required to provide an explanation of absence to the school on the day of absence or <u>within seven (7) days</u> from the first day of any period of absence, **otherwise it will remain unjustified**. If a student is absent for three (3) days or more a <u>Medical Certificate</u> is required.

Planned Travel

Planned travel should only be taken during school holidays. Students should be at school every day during school term, from beginning to end. Missing a day here or there may not seem like much, but absences add up. Every day matters and the school is here to support all students in attending and engaging with their learning every day of the term. If your child cannot be at school because they are sick, have a medical appointment, or other reasons, please inform the school of their absence.



TAFE Use

Students are reminded that the use of the adjacent TAFE facility to walk to and from Old Northern Rd is a privilege and not a right. Students are reminded to walk safely, quietly and quickly thorough the facility. Parents and carers are <u>not</u> permitted to enter, drive into, or park in the TAFE to pick up or drop off students.

Student pickup after school

A reminder about parking and picking up around our school in the afternoons, especially in the school bus bay, Carver Crescent, Christopher Street, Coronation Road, and Baulkham Hills TAFE areas.

Please ensure you follow all traffic rules (especially traffic lights and not parking across driveways) when you are in these areas. You could even have your student walk a little but further away from the school gate – to assist their physical health, and alleviate the heavy traffic at the end of the school day.

The Hills Shire Council will have compliance officers at various times in these locations to ensure all drivers are following required traffic rules.
